# Historical Background <br> "From every mountainside, let freedom ring." <br> -Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. 

On a summer day in 1893, Katharine Lee Bates jotted down words for "America the Beautiful" while looking out from the 14,000 -foot summit of Pikes Peak. She had no way of knowing her poem would one day become famous as a song. At the time, she wrote: "Near the top we had to leave the wagon and go the rest of the way on mules. I was very tired. But when I saw the view, I felt great joy. All the wonder of America seemed displayed there, with the sea-like expanse."

Since then many people have loved the song. It's even been regarded by some as our "unofficial" national anthem. Along the way, the original lyrics changed with different musical settings. A hymn melody by Samuel A. Ward eventually became the "America the Beautiful" most people know today, with "purple mountain majesties above the fruited plain." But there still was no actual chorus. These days the later verses are rarely even sung. Language changes with time. So does awareness of inclusion and diversity.

More than a century later, mountains remain a powerful image in Dr. King's "I Have a Dream" speech. "From every mountain side... let freedom ring!" This past year, for our town's MLK Day celebration, my friend Mike Bradley and I wondered: What if we had an anthem everyone could sing together? A song for all ages, colors, religions and beliefs. What if we could weave together the vision of "America the Beautiful" with Dr. King's dream for all America?

And so these new lyrics were born, first sung by our children's chorus. By the last verse, there was not a dry eye in the crowd. At a time when our country feels increasingly fractured, songs like this help bring us together. They remind us of the dreams we share in common: the promise of an America that is more than any one of us alone.
